MINUTES OF THE FDL SAILING CLUB MEETING SEPTEMBER 3, 2020

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 pm by Commodore Marty Witt. The meeting was held outside the Yacht club in a social distancing environment. Seventeen members were in attendance with three guests joining us this month; Paul Mueller, Stuart Doty and Lou Gross. Welcome guests – and future members!

The minutes of the August meeting were approved by the membership with no additions or corrections after motions by George Winters and Bill Freund respectively.

Treasurer Brian Carter reported the status of the FDLSC treasury including \$185 in racing fees and membership dues. He also reported a disbursement of \$58.03 for the pavilion rental which was authorized at last month's meeting. The pavilion is being used for this year's banquet/Change of watch due to the need for social distancing. His report was approved by the membership after motions by Jack Boatman and Don Cayen respectively.

Committee Reports:

Day Sailors report: Andy Gratton reported that races have been taking place, but this year a lack of wind has been a challenge. Andy also reminded day sailors that boats needed to be off the parking lot by September 13th.

Cruisers report: Jim Braun reported on the Cruisers and reported that the upcoming Frostbite race date has been changed to September 26th. He also stated that there would be no food for this year's race. There will be an entry fee just for non-members.

For the "Fun sail races", the start for the races will be at 6 pm due to the earlier sunsets at this time of year.


Adjournment:

Random Ravings PHRF Wars – when will it stop?

In today's uncertain times, I know what you're thinking – oh no, not another article on the challenges facing this nation; Pandemic, civil unrest, global warming (and seasonal cooling), elections and mail-in and take-out ballots, world-wide tampering with our political system, mask mandates – and Not just for Halloween.

Why are we so polarized today? I find it perplexing - And, quite frankly – I thought they stopped making those cameras. And you know they did in 2001 when they went bankrupt. But I just discovered that they started making them again which would explain this whole polarization thing. But I digress...

PHRF's. As a person new to sailing, it took me a few years to spell it correctly and another while to properly pronounce it. I have learned (with the help of our colleague Jim Braun providing me with a great website to research) that the Performance Handicap Rating Factor (PHRF) is "a subjective rating rule. PHRF was developed to handicap monohulls that didn't fit under the rubric of other handicap systems." (Careful here – while it is as challenging as the Rubik's cube they are not related. But I digress...

"PHRF assigns a boat a rating in seconds per mile (shown as s/M), which is multiplied by the length of the course and subtracted from the boat's elapsed time to give corrected time. Ratings are assigned by a committee of the local racing authority." Basically, the PHRF takes historical performance data for each boat design, ratings of similar boats and "a set of standard adjustments to basic ratings (e.g. fixed prop, extra-large sails, etc.")

So, the articles go on and on and on, with a lot of detailed information, calculations, blah, blah, blah. Frankly it seemed pretty confusing to me and I almost gave up on it *until* I came across a couple of key sentences...

"A member may appeal a rating, presenting evidence...which supports the appeal." **and** "Although PHRF is subjective, it still attempts to rate the boat, in racing trim, with a perfect crew." Come on! Are you kidding me?!

Let's start with the second sentence, shall we? In particular the phrase "perfect crew". I don't know about you, but I don't know anyone that is perfect. And if you accept that premise, doesn't it make sense that there is no such thing as a "perfect crew"? I have observed incredibly talented crews, extremely knowledgeable crews, magnificently effective crews, wonderfully passionate crews, and having crewed for several skippers I have personally been observed to be far from perfection in my assignments as a crew member. So there.

What is my point in all this ranting and raving? Well, you may think it's splitting hairs – but I believe that the verbiage should be changed from the assumption of a "perfect crew" to a "less than perfect crew". I'm just saying...

While I do take PHRF to task on the whole perfection thing, I applaud the element of appeal: "A member may appeal a rating, presenting evidence – which supports the appeal. I am not an attorney (nor lawyer if you prefer) – but I don't think you need to be one to provide grounds for an appeal. All you need is some common sense and an appreciation for reality.

I think there are several factors that should be considered for legitimate adjustments to one's PHRF rating. I believe that given the false assumption of a perfect crew, there are several factors that should be added to the "set of standard adjustments".

These are just a few:

For starters, if you have children, this is an automatic handicap. Let's face it. While children are wonderful, they have taken their toll. If you are sailing and have children in their teens at home, you deserve a double factor. You know what I'm talking about.

Sails. If your sails are like mine, circa Viking period woven wool sails, you should be given extra consideration, such as starting a day earlier than the rest.

Alcohol. If you are sailing without any alcohol on board, you should not be allowed to use any PHRF. If you are sailing without consumption of alcohol you should be required to take only half of your designated PHRF — unless you promise to start on your next race. If you simply do not drink alcohol as a standard part of your life, you must consume a minimum of a gallon of root beer. I'm just saying...

And finally -

Spouses and significant others. Are you kidding? There is no way I'm recommending an increase or decrease in PHRF on this one. I'll let the two of you argue this one out.
